Topics include general legal concepts of enforceable rights of obligation: types of laws and national legal systems: nature, purpose, scope and key principles of national legislation; sources of obligations; kinds of obligations under the Civil Code; specific circumstances affecting obligations in general (fortuitous events, frauds, negligence, delay and breach of contract); duties of obligor to do or not to do; extinguishment of obligation; general principles of the

law of contracts, elements and stages of contracts; freedom from contract and limitation; object of contracts; consideration of contracts; formalities; interpretations and reformation of contracts and defective contracts.

Course Name Conflict Prevention & Crisis Management

This course aims to familiarize students with the various problems which plague the post-Cold War international system. Following a conceptual/thematic focus, the course examines a number of broad themes by using case studies from Europe, Middle East, Asia and Africa. The course is divided into four sections: Whereas the first section will provide the students with the fundamental aspects of the current world order, with its hegemonic nations and institutions, the second section will deal with the changing dynamics of global economy and its structural problems. Third section will examine political issues such as democratization and human rights and the fourth section will focus on contemporary security issues such as nuclear proliferation and terrorism. The final section will deal with the regional conflicts in the Middle East, Asia and Africa.

The first part is organized chronologically and covers the period up to the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991. The goal for this part of the course is to provide some minimal essential background for those who have never had a course in Russian or Soviet history. The second part of the course is organized thematically. We learn about the basic institutional structure of Russian politics, assess the political and economic order created under Boris Yeltsin and Vladimir Putin, investigate some important challenges facing Russia today, and seek to understand Russia's current place in the world and where the country is going.

Pacific Asia is defined to comprise, in descending order of importance: China, Japan, the four Asian NIE's (newly industrialized economies, viz.: South Korea, Taiwan, Hong Kong, and Singapore), and ASEAN-5 (Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia, the Philippines, and Brunei; minus the newly admitted Indochina states and Myanmar, the former Burma). North Korea will also figure in our discussions of, among other things, the security problems endemic to the Korean peninsula and Northeast Asia.

This advanced seminar is designed to give graduate students a broad perspective of the EU's relations with third parties and its role in the international arena. It draws on European Integration theories to analyze the institutional mechanisms of EU's external relations. The course particularly aims to identify and systematically assess the nature of EU influence across issue areas. The seminar will highlight two broad questions: —What kind of a global actor is the EU? and —How does the EU act in the international arena? Therefore seminar starts with a brief overview of theories of European Integration. Following a brief examination of how the EU institutions formulate and execute their policies towards the world outside its borders the seminar will continue with the analysis of a wide range of policy processes, policies and policy instruments of the EU.

Course Code CIR 416 Course Name Global Governance T U L Kr ECTS

This graduate seminar explores the contested notion of global governance in both analytical and empirical perspectives. The central aim of the course is to examine the main factors and processes of global governance as applied to the contemporary global context. In the first half of the course, we will discuss various conceptual issues pertaining to global governance (e.g., definition, key actors, and various theoretical perspectives informing the contemporary debate on global governance). We will assess in particular the role of power, interests, international institutions, transnational networks, and ideas. The seminar will then delve into a wide range of substantive issue areas that are of global significance and often demand global solutions. Main topics include global economic governance, globalization, the environment, third-world state building, international justice, military intervention, nuclear proliferation, and global terrorism. We will apply competing analytical perspectives to different issue areas, as they intersect with the nature and management of global governance in the 21stcentury.
